Congratulations Ozanam! 2022 Recipients of Direct Relief Grant



Ozanam Charitable Pharmacy Receives a \$250,000 Grant Award from Direct Relief's Fund for Health Equity.

Mobile, Alabama, Dec. 12, 2022— Ozanam Charitable Pharmacy today announced it is among 71 awardees that received a grant from Direct Relief's Fund for Health Equity, which mobilizes financial resources for organizations focused on non-clinical interventions that affect a person's health. Commonly known as the social determinants of health, these factors include an individual's physical, social, cultural, and economic environment.

The grants, which total \$22.7 million and will be disbursed over two years, were awarded funding from philanthropist MacKenzie Scott, the AbbVie Foundation, and Eli Lilly and Co. to support underserved communities across the United States.

Ozanam Charitable Pharmacy received \$250,000 from the Fund for Health Equity for its work to expand the Pharmacy hours to include Fridays from 9 am to 1 pm. Having access to the Pharmacy on Fridays to pick up medication will allow our patients to pick up a prescription before the weekend when the Pharmacy is closed.

Also, Direct Relief's Fund for Health Equity will assist Ozanam Pharmacy with continued collaboration with A Servant Love Incorporated to increase the health outcomes of the patients. The Nutrition Rx Program provides fresh produce to encourage improved nutrition of more fruits and vegetables, improve blood pressure, blood glucose control, and weight status, and minimize food insecurity.

"We are extremely excited about receiving the Direct Relief's Funds for Health Equity to provide more access to life-sustaining treatment and nutrition for our patients. We are grateful to our Partnership with Direct Relief and MacKenzie Scott, the AbbVie Foundation, and Eli Lilly for this great opportunity," said Shearie Archer, Executive Director of Ozanam Charitable Pharmacy.

"We are pleased to bolster the indispensable work of Ozanam Charitable Pharmacy and other grassroots organizations striving to reduce disparities and increase equity in vulnerable populations across the United States," said Dr. Byron Scott, MD, MBA, Co-Chair of the Fund for Health Equity and Board Director of Direct Relief and Chair of its Medical Advisory Council. "It is a privilege to promote and support these organizations that are deeply connected to the communities they serve, know best what their patients and communities need, and the most effective means of providing it."

The organizations in the latest round of funding were chosen for their efforts to enhance workforce diversification, reduce health disparities, and expand innovative models of care.







THANK YOU TO OUR SUPPORTERS! Your Kindness and Compassion Are a Blessing to Ozanam Charitable Pharmacy's Patients

We are eternally grateful that you have chosen to support Ozanam Charitable Pharmacy this past year. Here at Ozanam Charitable Pharmacy, we witness the emergence of the human spirit every day. With your support, we are able not just to stand by but take action on building a solid medication safety net for our most vulnerable population.

Ozanam Charitable Pharmacy is committed to caring for those who struggle to access medication in our local community. Nearly 40% of our patients have diabetes, and many require insulin to treat their condition. For example, five flex pens with 3ml (1 carton) of short-acting (Novolog) insulin may cost as much as \$242 with discounts from GoodRx. In addition, long-acting (Tresiba) insulin, like five FlexTouch pens of 100 units/ml (1 carton), may cost as much as \$172.00. That's \$414.00 a month for individuals who may only make \$12,000 annually or – as is the case for many of our patients – far less than that. While much work is to be done to ensure that all Americans have access to affordable prescription medicine, Ozanam remains steadfast in its service to the community as a leading charitable medication safety net because of your support.

In addition to being a Medication Safety Net, we were also able to provide 30 chronically ill patients with fresh produce each month through the Rx Produce Program through a partnership with "A Servant Love, Inc." and the American Heart Association.

We continued to host Seven 4th Year Auburn University Harrison School of Pharmacy Students during their five weeks of rotations at Ozanam Charitable Pharmacy. Finally, we provided much-needed COVID-19 Vaccines and Flu shots to 20 patients with outreach to hundreds with funds provided by HRSA/Sostentos and with our partnership with Semmes Pharmacy and JH Clinical.

With support from people like you, Ozanam Charitable Pharmacy purchased nearly \$100,000 worth of generic medications with a focus on maintenance drugs for conditions such as high blood pressure, heart disease, diabetes, seizure disorders, stomach, and gastrointestinal health conditions, etc. In the fiscal year 2021-22 (October 1, 2021 - September 30, 2022), Ozanam dispensed 20,000 generic prescriptions, many of which were for a 90-day supply, to over 1316 patients. In combination with our Access Your Rx Patient Assistance Program, which connects our patients to name-brand prescription medicine from pharmaceutical and foundation Patient Assistance Programs, we provided needy residents of Mobile, Baldwin, Escambia, and Washington counties with over \$ 3 million in medication. With your support, we hope to ensure that no uninsured residents in our service area will go without the prescription medication they need due to limited financial resources.

Again, we sincerely appreciate your support, and our doors are always open for you to visit us. It takes a village to deliver one pill. Thank you for being a part of our Oz Squad.



During my time at Ozanam, I got to experience the different services they offer and the hard work that goes in to providing for their patients. While I was there, I reached out to patients to offer what I have learned in school to help them better manage their conditions, such as diabetes and high blood pressure, and ways they can make small lifestyle changes to greatly improve their health. I also assisted the pharmacists in filling prescriptions and getting to see community pharmacy from their point of view. I really enjoyed my time at Ozanam, getting to know the patients but also the incredible staff as well. My favorite part was being able to see the impact that Ozanam makes within their community and hearing from the patients what it means to them. I hope that when I become a pharmacist I can use this experience to better serve my community and my patients the way they do.




During my time at Ozanam, I was able to do a little bit of everything that the pharmacy had to offer, but where I spent the most time was providing MTM services to the patients. Medication Therapy Management (MTM) is a specialized service that pharmacist are able to provide. MTMs consist of one-on-one meetings that can be done in person or over the phone between the pharmacist and patient where all medications that the patient takes is assessed. This assessment covers things such as efficacy, safety, and appropriateness of a patient's medication. During each of these visits I was not only able to supply information to those who needed it but supplies as well. For example, if patients needed diabetes testing supplies or blood pressure meters, these were supplied at no cost to the patient. Over the 5 weeks that I spent doing these MTMs with patients I was completed around 12 in total. For each MTM, I was able to identify a new need or barrier that went beyond the medication filling process for the patient. One of my most memorable interventions was that of a safety intervention when I discovered that a patient was taking too much insulin, causing hypoglycemic events which would get so severe the patient had not reported any sings of hypoglycemia since adjusting the insulin injections. My time at Ozanam was invaluable because I got to see a side of pharmacy that is not often highlighted for pharmacy students. Through this experience I was able to see another world of pharmacy that I hope to adapt to my own pharmacy practice one day.


